Our approach:

Equip, Empower.... ENTRUST

We build a

partnership of equals

trusting Haitian mothers to serve

as trustworthy, dedicated

Water Women.



Equip, Empower.... ENTRUST HAITIAN WOMEN as HEROES.

We don't bring in foreign missioners to do training.

Instead, our training team is comprised solely of **Haitians serving Haitians.**

We don't come in as heroes.

Instead, we invite local women to be

heroes for their own communities.







Gaudium et Spes (The Constitution of the Church in the Modern World), a key document of Vatican II, redefined how we as Church see ourselves in relationship with the world. In this document, the bishops observed that there's always a temptation to **look to technology to solve the problems** of those who suffer.

Why the Sawyer PointONE?







- Haitian mothers walking for miles for the chance to become Water Women.



Improving likelihood of success

- Request originates from the community
- Shared sacrifice, lasting sense of ownership
- Water supply source(s) confirmed
- Capable, trusted local implementing partners
- Strengthening local governance, O&M
- Follow up visits





3 significant challenges

- Technical, social, financial limitations
- Overcoming past negative experiences communities have from prior efforts
- Avoiding dividing a community between "haves" and "have nots"





those challenges

- Enter a community to understand what is needed and what is possible; being intentional to minimize raising expectations
- Listening... learning from community's past experiences. All parties committing to follow through to completion
- Plan for reaching all who want to participate in the community, (even if needing to implement in phases)



Growing relationships during challenging times



- "Stay with the people", being present remotely...
- Shared prayer
- Virtual web meetings
- Embracing new paradigms increased reliance on and trust in local partners






3 key takeaways
